

Full-Year Course*

- In addition to viewing daily student attendance in Parent Access, parents can view an attendance summary which is posted under the documents tab on the first of every month.
- Once a student has accumulated 14 absences:
 - a. A mandatory parent meeting will be scheduled with the Vice Principal overseeing attendance.
 - b. Loss of credit will be assigned.
 - c. No credit (NC) will appear on the student's report card and transcript.
 - d. Please note that every 3 lates to the same class equates to an absence in that class.

Semester Course*

- In addition to viewing daily student attendance in Parent Access, parents can view an attendance summary which is posted under the documents tab on the first of every month.
- Once a student has accumulated 7 absences:
 - a. A mandatory parent meeting will be scheduled with the Vice Principal overseeing attendance.
 - b. Loss of credit will be assigned.
 - c. No credit (NC) will appear on the student's report card and transcript.
 - d. Please note that every 3 lates to the same class equates to an absence in that class.

Physical Education/Health

Students who have been medically excused for a period of time must return to PE on the date the medical note expires or will be in jeopardy of losing PE credit unless all missed PE classes are made up.

NJDOE requires high school students to participate in 150 minutes of PE/Health a week. If a student accumulates more than six (6) absences in PE, they are required to make-up classes by completing 2 make-up classes for each class needed. See your PE teacher to schedule make-up classes which are held once a week, 2:15 - 2:40 pm (25 mins) and must be completed within the same marking period. If a student needs to make-up classes in the following marking period, it must be approved by the PE department supervisor.

If a student accumulates more than six (6) absences in health, administration will decide if the course will be repeated the following year, the course is taken on-line, or complete a comprehensive health packet.

Excused Absences

Students with excessive excused absences may be considered for loss of credit based on individual circumstances.
